- * **Wabanaki REACH Mapping workshop**, an interactive storytelling experience to teach about events in the colonizing history of Wabanaki people and their descendants. February 1, 2020, time TBD.

- * **Shay Stewart-Bouley workshop (Black Girl in Maine)**, an interactive workshop combining lecture and small-group work, allowing participants to deepen their knowledge of racism, examine their own biases, and learn techniques for starting conversations on racism and difference in predominantly white spaces. April 15, 2020, time TBD.
