In these unforeseen times, there are things we can do and things we cannot. As Treasurer, I wanted to report to you about our finances for



the current fiscal year, July 2019 to June 2020. Fortunately, our worship program is alive with evolving online Sunday services, newsletters are providing information and inspiration to us all, and our church building sits and waits for our return. However, we cannot do a spring fund-raising event, nor can we continue Concerts for a Cause, nor will we have rental income. And we cannot send 50% of the cash from non-existent Church services to help needy charities – when there is no plate. And, oh my, with precipitous drops in the financial markets, where our Investment Fund will be is anyone's guess.

Although we have emergency funds, and may have to use them if this extraordinary situation continues for very long, please think now about what you would normally give to the church in pledge payments, plate offerings and so forth for the remainder of this fiscal year. We still need that income. Currently, the mail system is the only way to send in those donations and pledge payments. (Thanks again to all those who have signed up for Auto-pay.)

But we will be introducing a credit card pay system shortly, something we've avoided in the past, but in the current situation it makes sense, and perhaps this additional donation route will appeal to some people.

Covid-19 has impacted all of us in one way or another and we do understand if you do not feel comfortable giving to the church at this time. Please take care of yourselves and your loved ones and let us know if we can help in any way. – Paul

To use Zoom, you will need to download the Zoom software onto your computer. Then, to join meetings, you simply click on the link your host provides and follow the instructions. But, even that can feel confusing at times, so we suggest you find a "how to use Zoom" lesson on YouTube. That way, you can learn how to use the software at your own pace, with no pressure.
